## MiniSurvey Series – Consolidated Dispatch Programs

The Center for Municipal Research & Innovation conducted a survey of the 412 municipalities in Florida regarding their use of consolidated dispatch programs. The survey was conducted electronically from April 2-23, 2019, with a response rate of 43% or 177 cities.

### **Key Take-Aways**

### Of municipalities who responded:

- 53% of cities participate in a consolidated dispatch program.
  - More than half of cities (54%) who do not participate in a consolidated dispatch program have a population under 5,000.

### Of cities participating in some form of consolidated dispatch program:

- The most common type of consolidated dispatch program is a city/county program for both law enforcement and fire/EMS (44%).
- The most used consolidated dispatch format is a traditional program contracted out to another agency or regional communication center (57%).
  - The second most common format is a centralized consolidated dispatch program communications systems and equipment are shared between two or more agencies at a single location.
  - Rarely used is the co-location consolidated dispatch program in which separate agencies share a communication center facility with each agency having its own staff, CAD, protocols, etc.
- Cities most often adopt a consolidated dispatch program through interlocal agreements (60%).
  - 80% of municipalities state that their consolidated dispatch agreements have not changed substantially since their original adoption.
- Nearly half of cities (47%) do not pay a direct fee for their consolidated dispatch program as it is either funded wholly by the county or by a countywide tax.
  - 30% of cities report that they pay a fee on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis.
