**ALACHUA**



The City of Alachua celebrated Florida City Government Week by presenting a five-part video series on social media detailing what has made Alachua a special place to live since 1905, the year it incorporated. The videos were hosted by a different commissioner each day and featured a look into the city's history, public services, economic prosperity and quality of life, before culminating the week with Mayor Gib Coerper giving viewers a look toward Alachua's future.

**ARCADIA**

The City of Arcadia established a Citizens' Academy to coincide with Florida City Government Week. Academy members began with a visit to the Utilities Department and Water and Sewer Department. They viewed the water and wastewater plants to learn how they operate and their costs. Next, they visited the airport and golf course to see improvements. Finally, the members toured the Arcadia Police Department and became acquainted with the marshal and lieutenant.



**ATLANTIC BEACH**

The City of Atlantic Beach began Florida City Government Week with an essay contest for sixth-graders titled "If I Were a Mayor." The city also unveiled a program that will help residents understand their city government. The program will include hosting quarterly "Atlantic Beach Government 101 Overview and Q&A" classes, updating the city website to include a "Government 101" portal and city leaders going into classrooms to educate students. Atlantic Beach was also recognized as a Purple Heart City.




**BELLE ISLE**



To celebrate Florida City Government Week, the City of Belle Isle posted trivia questions each day at City Hall. If residents answered the questions correctly, they received Florida City Government Week buttons and bumper stickers. Belle Isle also hosted a Halloween event that included an invitation to residents to trick or treat and to tour City Hall to learn about the duties of Belle Isle's employees.

**BOCA RATON**

At the October 23 City Council meeting, the City of Boca Raton recognized student government bodies from local high schools and colleges/universities. The city also used social media to promote civic engagement. It informed residents through short, interactive videos about how to get involved with the city and how Boca Raton serves its residents.



**BRADENTON BEACH**

During Florida City Government Week, the City of Bradenton Beach and Mayor John Chappie announced the launch of a new pilot program: Youth in Politics, which is fashioned to introduce young children to local government. Additionally, the city opened its doors to 75 third-graders for one day to become “local politicians.” Since that time, Bradenton Beach has been contacted by multiple local schools, and the city is planning to host even more schools in 2019.



**BROOKSVILLE**

The City of Brooksville Fire Department held educational field trips and tours during October to incorporate Fire Prevention Week and Florida City Government Week. Fire Chief Ronald Snowberger arranged for groups of elementary schoolchildren to take tours of the station, which included firefighter and firetruck demonstrations.



**BUNNELL**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Bunnell held a “Meet ‘n Greet” that gave citizens time to talk with the mayor, vice mayor, commissioners, the new city manager and staff members to gain information about their city and how they can get involved. After the “Meet ‘n Greet,” the regular meeting of the Bunnell City Commission was held.



**CAPE CANAVERAL**



The City of Cape Canaveral marked Florida City Government Week with three activities that gave local elementary students a behind-the-scenes look at municipal government. Fourth-grade students were treated to a presentation by the Culture & Leisure Services Department. Third-graders participated in a mock city council meeting, where they discussed single-use plastics and their impact on the environment. Cape Canaveral wrapped up the week by hosting a tour of city facilities and departments for fifth-grade students.

**COCONUT CREEK**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Coconut Creek filmed and highlighted 17 city employees on social media and the city’s website; posted historical facts about the city on social media; placed Florida City Government Week banners on local streets; and promoted city facts, classes and initiatives on the city’s website. Speakers, including the vice mayor, visited local schools to discuss topics such as safety, engineering and sustainable development.

**CORAL GABLES**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Coral Gables held a social media photo contest for residents and visitors to showcase their favorite spots in the city by using the hashtag #PartofGables. Additionally, the second annual poster was launched that celebrates employees and the services that local government provides. Coral Gables closed out the week with an ice cream social for employees.



**DADE CITY**



The City of Dade City hosted fifth-graders from Pasco Elementary and R.B. Cox Elementary School at City Hall. The students interacted with city staff, members of the Police Department, public works employees and several commissioners. Students also participated in a mock commission meeting, “Touch a Truck” with the street sweeper and a tour of the Police Department.

**DAVIE**

For Florida City Government Week, the Town of Davie hosted a tour of Town Hall for 98 students and teachers. Students met Mayor Judy Paul, Town Attorney John C. Rayson and Councilwoman Susan Starkey. They also met with town staff members from the Budget and Finance, Human Resources, Public Works, Parks and Recreation, Cultural Arts, Fire and Police departments.

**DEFUNIAK SPRINGS**

During Florida City Government week, 30 students toured the DeFuniak Springs Police Department and were treated to doughnuts during a Q&A meeting with Marshal Mark Weeks. An additional 100 students toured City Hall council chambers, met the mayor and city manager, and heard presentations from the Public Works and Sanitation departments. During a city government “Meet and Greet” public reception, residents met with new City Manager Mell Smigielski and members of the City Council.



**ESTERO**



During Florida City Government week, Mayor James R. Boesch, Vice-Mayor William F. Ribble and Councilmembers Jim Wilson, Jon McLain, Katy Errington and Nicholas Batos participated in the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the first residential building in Genova. Genova is the first residential community to be approved in Estero’s newly created Village Center.


**FORT PIERCE**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Fort Pierce hosted a scavenger hunt that led citizens throughout the city. At each stop, city staff gave citizens puzzles to solve before hunters could proceed to the next stop. Each stop showcased an important spot for art, culture or history in Fort Pierce.



**GOLDEN BEACH**

At Golden Beach’s October Town Council meeting, the town displayed special items from its Police Department, which included a canine unit and a pink Breast Cancer Awareness police cruiser. During Golden Beach’s annual Halloween event, residents interacted with the Police Department and received “My Town, I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It” buttons.



**GREENACRES**

The City of Greenacres hosted approximately 45 students from the L.C. Swain Middle School pre-law program during Florida City Government Week. They held a mock city council meeting and toured all the city departments. City Attorney Glen J. Torcivia and City Clerk Joanna L. Cunningham talked to them about elections, passports and opportunities in government.



**HOLLY HILL**



The City of Holly Hill invited local students to City Hall for Florida City Government Week. The mayor and commissioners each selected a student and prepared him or her about how to conduct a city commission meeting. Other students acted as the audience. They could ask questions, share their concerns and vote on items being discussed. Additionally, staff from the Public Works Department showed students the heavy equipment they use, and the Police and Fire departments discussed their work.

**LADY LAKE**

The Town of Lady Lake celebrated the week with a photo contest that asked residents to enter an image that celebrates “My Town: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It.” The town hosted a meet and greet with the commissioners, town manager and staff members and held an event with the Public Works and Parks and Recreation departments where residents could ask questions and view equipment demonstrations. Residents also met with police officers and asked questions about their work.



**LAKE PARK**



The Town of Lake Park celebrated Florida City Government Week with 65 fifth-grade students and five teachers from Lake Park Elementary School and Lake Park Baptist School. The students and teachers participated in a mock commission meeting; department skits; a public works’ demonstration; and a tour of Town Hall, the library and the sheriff’s office. Students and teachers were also greeted by the Palm Beach County Sheriff’s Office Mounted Unit and Motorcycle Unit.

**MARCO ISLAND**



During Florida City Government Week, the City of Marco Island hosted activities for its residents including a movie in the park, a workshop on local iguanas and a citywide cleanup event. Third- and fifth-graders joined the Parks and Recreation Department staff for the cleanup. Additionally, Marco Island hosted a City Hall open house at which residents were invited to eat and meet with city officials and staff.

**MOUNT DORA**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Mount Dora produced videos highlighting city departments. Mount Dora focused on public safety, events, public works and the city’s library programs. The city’s electric crew spoke with students at Head Start and showcased their equipment. On Saturday, the largest event of the year, the Mount Dora Craft Fair, brought thousands of Florida citizens into Mount Dora. Residents interacted with city staff, police officers, firefighters, the mayor and councilmembers.



**MULBERRY**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Mulberry hosted an informative week for the city’s young people. City department heads visited Mulberry High School and Mulberry Middle School, while the two local elementary schools visited City Hall. Additionally, the Mulberry Civic Teen Advisory Board was announced as a winner in the Florida League of Cities’ 2018 Video Competition.



**NEWBERRY**




The City of Newberry held a “My City” event at the Newberry Branch Library. The event included activities for all ages that promoted municipal government and the services it provides to Newberry citizens. The city hosted a utility bucket truck and a firetruck on site for participants to explore and interact with staff. The mayor and commissioners were available for questions. The library also hosted Newberry trivia, municipal trivia and a craft for kids.

**OCEAN BREEZE**

For Florida City Government Week, City of Ocean Breeze Mayor Karen Ostrand spoke about the history of Home Rule at the Town Council meeting. Council Vice President Ann Kagdis distributed “Our Town” buttons and stickers and gave a historical overview of the Town of Ocean Breeze, one of the smallest towns in Florida.

**PALM SPRINGS**



Village Manager Richard J. Reade and various department directors visited Palm Springs Middle School during the week to engage students in a discussion about city government, including the city’s responsibilities and the services it provides. Seventh-grade students held a mock council meeting to consider a proposed redevelopment project. The students were invited to a Village Council meeting, where they sat with the mayor, council and staff members. Students assisted with running the meeting, presenting staff recommendations and considering agenda items for approval.

**PARKLAND**

The City of Parkland hosted 600 third-grade students from local elementary schools at City Hall. Students had the opportunity to visit with the mayor to learn about her responsibilities, explore police and fire equipment and trucks, learn the ins and outs of recycling and waste pickup, and participate in an election at the Parkland Library.



**PORT ST. LUCIE**



For Florida City Government Week, the City of Port St. Lucie hosted a group of fifth-grade students who spent the day immersed in the work of their local government. They participated in a mock city council meeting, were able to see the city’s Swamp Meister in action, see the Police Department’s K-9s at work and learn about how recycling can benefit their neighborhoods.



**SANFORD**

#FCGWeek in Sanford began when Mayor Jeff Triplett called on city staff and his fellow commissioners for a “family photo” as he read the Florida City Government Week proclamation. Members of the Mayor’s Youth Council and Seminole High School’s Young Men of Excellence Program met at City Hall to learn about local government initiatives and to share peer-to-peer their own ideas about what local government means to them. Additionally, the city held its groundbreaking event for the RiverWalk Phase 3 Seawall.



**SURFSIDE**



During Florida City Government Week, the Town of Surfside hosted a behind-the-scenes Town Hall tour. Participants met members of town departments and walked through the police facility. After the tour, participants enjoyed an ice cream social with Mayor Daniel Dietch. Additionally, the Town of Surfside held a special edition of its “Coffee with the Cops” with Surfside Police Chief Julio Yero and his officers.

**TALLHASSEE**

The City of Tallahassee produced a video highlighting its residents to kick off Florida City Government Week. During the week, the video was shared on the city’s social media platforms and aired on the city’s television channel more than 300 times.



**TARPON SPRINGS**

Mayor Chris Alahouzos visited with students at Tarpon Springs Middle School to celebrate Florida City Government Week. Alahouzos shared with the students the important role that city government plays in their lives, and students watched the City Government 101 video.



**TEMPLE TERRACE**

The City of Temple Terrace partnered with Florida College for its Second Annual Florida City Government Day program. Eleven college students selected a city director to shadow and learn about the director’s responsibilities. The students then researched how transitioning to a four-day workweek would affect their chosen departments. After spending an hour with their city mentors, the students held a mock city council meeting debating the merits of the hypothetical schedule change. A reception followed where students networked with elected officials and staff.



**VENICE**

For Florida City Government Week, the City of Venice held poster contests in two elementary schools. Participants drew or painted to the theme, “My City, I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It.” Their works will be installed at City Hall. Seventeen city officials and staff members read aloud to students in kindergarten through second grade at Venice Elementary School. Venice also hosted a “Make a Difference Day” in which more than 440 volunteers turned out to beautify the city’s parks.



**WEBSTER**



The City of Webster is a designated “Bee City.” During Florida City Government Week, Webster invited residents to City Hall to learn about pollinators and what the city does to help establish plants for pollinators. They also learned how to make bee condos. The Public Works Department taught residents how to read water meters, and staff members spoke about the proper care of grinder pumps. During the week, Congressman Daniel Webster, city councilmen and staff members were available in City Hall to meet and speak with citizens.

**WESTON**

During Florida City Government Week, the City of Weston kicked off the 17th annual Weston University Program. The program exposes students to local government, giving them firsthand insight into the work that goes into running a city. As customary, the first program day, held during Florida City Government Week, included an overview by City Manager John R. Flint, a session with Mayor Daniel J. Stermer, and ethics and legal perspectives by City Attorney Jamie A. Cole.


**WINTER HAVEN**

Staff from Technology Services and the public library hosted a “Technology Petting Zoo” to offer residents hands-on technology experiences, creating greater engagement and more powerful learning opportunities. The week ended with a fun “Ghouls’ Day Out” Halloween event for hundreds of children.


# 2017 Florida City Government Week

**BOWLING GREEN**

**Bowling Green** kicked off its first year participating in Florida City Government Week by inviting residents to see the passing of its resolution and to learn about the importance of cities. During the city's Fall Festival, the mayor and volunteers greeted children with "My City" buttons and bumper stickers. Bowling Green held a photo contest for school-aged children to take a picture with a city landmark. Bowling Green's goal was to promote the city while building a strong community spirit and pride.

**BRANFORD**



**Branford** Town Clerk Donna Hardin and Mayor Mickey Dempsey shared city government books with Branford High School's civics teachers. During an assembly at the high school, Hardin and Dempsey explained city government to students. Following the assembly, both officials participated in the homecoming parade and distributed "My Town" buttons and bumper stickers.

**CAPE CANAVERAL**

Over the course of Florida City Government Week, departments and contracted agencies from the **City of Cape Canaveral** came together to educate approximately 350 students from all grades at Cape View Elementary School and encourage their participation in the city government. All city departments, the Brevard County Sheriff's Office Cape Canaveral Precinct and Canaveral Fire Rescue led the events. Third graders joined Mayor Pro Tem Brendan McMillan and staff for a mock city council meeting.



**COCOA**



During Florida City Government Week, the residents of **Cocoa** were invited to an open house that featured table-top displays from each city department. Residents spoke with city staff and representatives about services offered and they asked questions about other city issues. Residents also created a mural about why they love Cocoa that will be displayed at City Hall. Along with the open house, Cocoa held an online scavenger hunt to promote city services to residents.

**CRESTVIEW**

The **City of Crestview's** elected officials and department heads held several events during Florida City Government Week. The week began with an open house on Monday following the city's regular workshop, and ended by serving citizens at a local restaurant on Historic Downtown Main Street.



**DAVENPORT**

The **City of Davenport** invited its residents to an open house for Florida City Government Week to meet with their city commissioners and staff. Each department set up tables to highlight current projects and displayed equipment and gear, including the city's original traffic signal and two water meters from the 1920s. Residents could register to vote, learn about city recycling and meet with the city's Police and Fire departments. Spot, the Fire Department's mascot, greeted residents at the door.



**DAVIE**

As part of Florida City Government Week, students from Summit Questa Montessori School were invited to tour **Davie Town Hall**. Students visited the Town Council chambers and observed town staff performing daily tasks in the Budget and Finance, Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs, Public Works, Utilities Customer Service and Town Clerk's offices. Students then met with Mayor Judy Paul and Councilmember Susan Starkey to ask town- and government-related questions.



**DEBARY**

The **City of DeBary** celebrated Florida City Government Week by inviting its residents to an activity-filled evening. The evening began with a welcome from the mayor and an Air One fly over. Throughout the evening, residents toured the police and fire stations, watched governance presentations in the council chambers, and watched several competitions between the Police and Fire departments, including a football toss, trike relay race and basketball-shooting competition.

**DEFUNIAK SPRINGS**

**DeFuniak Springs** Mayor Bob Campbell wanted to engage residents using the "My City: I'm Part of It, I'm Proud of It" theme. The city hosted activities throughout Florida City Government Week in hopes of reaching all residents. The week kicked off with the presentation of the city's proclamation and continued with presentations from the Public Works Department, Fire Department, Police Department and airport, and a meet and greet with elected officials, city staff and the new city manager.





**DELRAY BEACH**



To launch Florida City Government Week, **Delray Beach** Mayor Cary Glickstein joined two students at Carver Middle School in the reading of the city's new proclamation. Afterward, the mayor spoke to several classes on the importance of city government. Students had the opportunity to ask questions, drawing upon the knowledge they learned in their civics class.

**FORT PIERCE**

During the week, **Fort Pierce** celebrated what makes the city great, including its rich history. The city hosted a historic scavenger hunt to give residents an opportunity to discover clues that would teach them about Fort Pierce's heritage. At each stop along the way, residents interacted with city employees to help them uncover the hidden message.



**FRUITLAND PARK**

The **Fruitland Park City Commission** issued a proclamation recognizing students of great achievement. They recognized Sophia Hurtt, who attends the Villages Charter School, and the 2017-2018 Fruitland Park Elementary School National Elementary Honor Society students with academic performance of 3.5 or higher who volunteer in the community.



**GREENACRES**

During Florida City Government Week, **Greenacres** celebrated by inviting local children to City Hall to learn about the importance of voting and held a mock election. Children learned about the city clerk's position, traveled to the Public Works Department to see mechanics work on a fire truck engine, and visited the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office to learn about safety.



**HAINES CITY**



The **City of Haines City** invited local children, aged 13-17, to participate in a writing contest themed "What I Love About My City." Three winners were chosen. Inez Cruz, the first-place contest winner, read her essay during the City Commission meeting.

**HAVANA**

For Florida City Government Week, the **Town of Havana** invited 30 students of various ages to visit the council chambers. Havana also invited seventh grade students to a special program that included a tour of council chambers and town departments, along with lunch on the lawn at Town Hall.



**HILLARD**

The **Town of Hilliard** invited local fourth graders to participate in an essay contest themed "If I were Mayor for the day." Three winners – Brian Wheat, Emma Dillard and Kaylee Hobbs – were selected. They were invited to a Town Council meeting where the mayor read their essays and presented each winner with a prize.



**HOLLY HILL**

Seventh grade students in **Holly Hill** conducted a mock city commission meeting with the mayor, city commissioners and city clerk. The mock agenda allowed the students to vote on issues and learn from city staff about their positions on the topics being discussed. Students then toured City Hall and various departments, including the Police Department.



**KISSIMMEE**

The **City of Kissimmee** celebrated Florida City Government Week by hosting an array of events. These included a poster contest, a showcase by the Public Works Department, a trivia contest and a virtual tour of City Hall and its departments. The celebrations concluded with “Coffee with a Commissioner.”

**JUPITER**



For Florida City Government Week, the **Town of Jupiter** created a “Get Involved” campaign to encourage its residents to participate in their local government by attending all town public meetings. Jupiter tested its residents about different town departments through “Did You Know” facts that were sent out via social media and email blasts.

**Lake Clarke Shores** President Pro-Tem Robert M. W. Shalhoub visited a local preschool to read “D is for Democracy,” and he passed out coloring books from the Police Department. The town also hosted “Coffee with the Town Administrator & Chief of Police” for residents to learn about town projects, ask questions and share concerns or ideas. The gathering was so successful that the town hopes to continue inviting residents to meetings held every few months.

**LAKE PARK**

**LEESBURG**

The **City of Leesburg** celebrated Florida City Government Week in a variety of ways. The city hosted an “I Love Leesburg” community appreciation event for all city workers, and created “What Makes Leesburg Great” videos and a webpage to celebrate the week. The city also partnered with the Leesburg Center for the Arts for a photo contest, and handed bumper stickers and buttons to residents visiting City Hall.



**LYNN HAVEN**

**Lynn Haven** invited its residents to participate in a variety of activities surrounding Florida City Government Week. The week began with coffee with the mayor and commissioners. Activities included the mayor speaking to seventh grade civics students, and the Lynn Haven Senior Center distributing buttons and bumper stickers. Educational fire safety demonstrations were held, and the Lynn Haven Library invited children to story time.


**MELBOURNE**




**PORT ST. LUCIE**



**VENICE**


**WINTER HAVEN**




Florida City Government Week is a statewide celebration to raise public awareness about the services that cities provide and to educate the public on how city government works.


**CAPE CANAVERAL**


**PENSACOLA**

# Florida City Government Week

An education in city government and civic involvement

In Florida **Gov. Rick Scott's** resolution observing October 18-24, 2015, as **Florida City Government Week**, he reminded citizens that this week “offers an important opportunity to convey to all of the citizens in Florida that they can shape and influence government through their civic involvement.” It is a message cities throughout the state give their constituencies each and every day. City government is the government closest to the people and has the most direct daily impact on its residents. Florida City Government Week provides a great opportunity for citizens to receive more information about how cities operate and the services they provide.



The following are highlights of how some of Florida's cities recognized the week:

**ARCADIA**



Arcadia officials held a mock city council meeting with the seventh-grade civics classes of DeSoto Middle School. They guided the class through the city council meeting and helped them to make decisions on how to deal with the items on the agenda. The **City of Arcadia** owns a 1926 fire engine that was displayed for the class to view after the meeting.

The first class met on October 22 at Lakefront Park for an evening with the Parks and Recreation Department. The director gave a tour of the park and students got a sneak peek into the city's annual Haunted House.

**LAKE MARY**



Students from Crystal Lake Elementary in **Lake Mary** participated in City Government Day where they saw demonstrations and displays from the city's Fire, Police, Parks and Recreation, and Public Works departments. **Orange City** Elementary School's Student Government Association visited the Orange City Council Chambers to celebrate city government and were given a lesson on how the city is run. They met and ate lunch with City Council members. After a lesson on local government and the history of Orange City, staff asked the students to participate in a drawing contest. They were asked to draw what Orange City means to them. Students did a great job and also answered trivia questions about Orange City. They then toured City Hall and the Police and Fire departments.

PARKER

PORT ST. LUCIE



# Florida City Government Week

Civic education takes center stage

Florida City Government Week was held October 19-25, 2014. This is an annual event to raise public awareness about how city government works and showcase the services that cities provide.

Cities throughout the state celebrated the week, which was proclaimed by Gov. Rick Scott. A summary of Florida City Government Weeks activities follows.



**CITY OF BELLE GLADE**

Florida League of Cities President **Lori Moseley** attended the October 20 **Belle Glade** City Commission meeting to hear essays read by students from the city’s Youth Empowerment Center (YEC). The students – YEC President **Kevin Ingle**, First Vice President **John Charles**, Second Vice President **Mardocho Juene** and Ambassador **Jenoute Mytil** – read their essays, titled “My City: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It.”

Moseley also presented the students with a special award for achieving third place in the League’s **Municipal Youth Council Video Competition**. Their award-winning video was shown to attendees and was received with overwhelming applause. Moseley congratulated the students for their outstanding video presentation and for their accomplishments in the community.



**CITY OF BUNNELL**

The **City of Bunnell** held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the opening of its new Municipal Complex. The three-building complex will house all departments, including the Police Department and a separate facility for conducting city meetings. A municipal park is also planned for the site. Artwork by local artists, along with historical documents and artifacts depicting the early days of the city, was displayed. Also, staff members gave attendees tours of the new facility. The tours concluded in the City Commission Chambers, where guests were treated to a luncheon and music. 
**CITY OF KISSIMMEE**

**CITY OF ORANGE CITY**

**Orange City** invited the Student Government Association from Orange City Elementary School to the Council Chambers. Students were presented with a brief history of Orange City and a description of each department. They met with the city manager, mayor and other council members for a question-and-answer session, followed by lunch. Then, the students had a lesson on how local ordinances are created. During a mock council meeting, students played the roles of council members and concerned citizens. The program ended with a tour of historic Town Hall and the Fire Department Station 67.



**CITY OF PALATKA**

Students from Palatka High School learned about local government during the week. They culminated their studies with a visit to City Hall and a **Palatka City Commission** meeting. Prior to their visit, the students elected a mayor and commissioners, who learned how to legislate and conduct business, and they learned about careers in municipal government. The students culminated their visit by opening the Palatka City Commission meeting with a “mock” meeting during which they issued proclamations and made, debated and voted on motions. **Mayor Vernon Myers** presented “Good Government” certificates to participating students.

**CITY OF PALM BEACH GARDENS**

The **City of Palm Beach Gardens** highlighted what makes the city a special place to live. In addition to hosting community events throughout the week, the city launched a social media campaign aimed at educating the public on the many roles filled by the city. To accomplish this, Palm Beach Gardens chose to shine the spotlight on city employees in a campaign titled “Gardens is . . . Beautiful, Brave, Bold & Blooming.” The concept was to fit city departments and divisions into one of these four categories.

**VILLAGE OF PALM SPRINGS**

The mayor, Village Council and village department heads participated in the Literacy Foundation reading day, which occurred during Florida City Government Week. The city officials visited five schools to read to students and disseminated “My Village: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It” buttons and bumper stickers to 500 children and their teachers.





**CITY OF PARKER**

The city continued its partnership with Parker Elementary School by hosting three fifth-grade students who won an essay contest that explained how the students would spend \$100,000 to help Parker. The students and guests toured city departments, saw police dog Marlin sniff out contraband, and ate a “fireman’s” lunch in the fire house. The event concluded with the reading of proclamations. Essay winners were **Jaice Jensen** as mayor, **Janay Harrel** as police chief and **Taylor Jordan** as fire chief.

**CITY OF SANFORD**

**Mayor Jeff Triplett** met with two of **Sanford’s** high school principals and the Seminole County School Board chair to talk about developing an ongoing City of Sanford Mayor’s Youth Council, targeted to begin in the 2015-2016 school year. With guidance from the League’s “A Guide for Creating a City Youth Council,” the city is in its planning stages. The School Board has also begun drafting a memorandum of understanding. The city plans to align the youth council’s mission with the Mission and Vision of the City of Sanford, helping to materialize the city’s newly adopted Strategic Plan. It will help guide the students through their own decision making while on the youth council. The goals of the youth council are to spark the students’ interest to take action on real-life issues and make a difference in their city, and for the students to experience how local government works to develop public policies that will affect their generation and generations to come.



**CITY OF SEMINOLE**

**City of Seminole Mayor Leslie Waters**, along with **Fire Chief Heather Burford** and **Recreation Director Becky Gunter**, hosted 53 fourth-grade students from Indian Rocks Christian School for a mock council meeting. Students were on the dais serving as student councilors, city attorney and city manager. A student also “staffed” the clerk’s desk. Students came up to the lectern and asked city-related questions that the mayor and councilors discussed and answered. Several students completed “Request to Speak” cards. Topics discussed included building the new Seminole City Centre mall, their wish for more bike paths, and their excitement over a future kayak/canoe launch at Waterfront Park.



**CITY OF ST. CLOUD**

The **City of St. Cloud** sponsored a Student Government Day at City Hall. St. Cloud officials and staff hosted 19 St. Cloud High School seniors, who experienced firsthand the vital role played by city government in citizens’ lives. City council members and staff briefed the students, who participated in a mock city-council meeting.



**CITY OF STUART**

Commissioners from the **City of Stuart** met with 12 civics classes at Stuart Middle School to discuss the role of city government and educate students on what their city does. The city clerk judged a pumpkin carving contest at Pine Elementary School. Information on the city and its role was disseminated.



**TOWN OF WINDERMERE**

Third-grade students from Windermere Elementary School took a walk to the Windermere Town Hall to learn about the town's government, including the Police and Fire departments. They were greeted by **Mayor Gary Bruhn**, who provided them with a history of the town and discussed how the town functions and the services that are provided. They also heard from **Windermere Police Chief David Ogden** and **Ocoee Deputy Fire Chief Tom Smothers**, followed by a presentation from **Windermere Town Manager Robert Smith**. One by one, they explained the job that they do and how their department operates, and then answered the students' many questions. They learned about public safety equipment and were able to hold a police officer's protective vest, sit in the front of a police vehicle, look at the Fire Department's lifesaving tools and learn what a day in the life of a firefighter is like. And after a full morning of learning, the students visited Allen's Creamery for a snack before heading back to school. Also, all four classes of third graders were able to recite the Preamble to the Constitution from memory.

# Open Houses, Career Days, Mock Council Meetings and More

Florida city officials teach the importance of municipal government

**F**lorida City Government Week was launched by the Florida League of Cities in 1991. It is part of an ongoing effort to raise public awareness about how city government works and the services that cities provide.

In 2013, Florida City Government Week was held October 20-26. Cities throughout the state participated in this annual event, which was proclaimed by the governor. A summary of those civic education activities follows.



## **BELLE GLADE**

The City of Belle Glade presented Certificates of Excellence to local elementary, middle and high school students who earned Level 5 on school FCAT tests. The city's elected officials and staff, school superintendent, education committee, principals and staff from the schools, and parents were present at the awards ceremony. In addition, each city staff member received a "My City: I'm Part of It, I'm Proud of It" button and bumper sticker, and the week was advertised on the city's marquee and banners posted at City Hall.

**CAPE CANAVERAL**

The City of Cape Canaveral issued a Florida City Government Week proclamation. In addition, the city again partnered with Cape View Elementary School for the week. Each grade (k - 6) traveled to various locations throughout the city to learn how their city government works. Events included a tour/demonstration at the public works department and a mock code enforcement board meeting. The city received thank you notes from the students that were posted on the city's website.



**DESTIN**

The City of Destin hosted its annual open house on October 23. Nearly 300 people attended the event, which showcased all city departments. City staff met with residents and educated them on the day-to-day operations of the city, as well as on large and small projects. The mayor and council honored city volunteers by presenting them with the new Destin Coin, a symbol of pride and responsibility. A free community shred day was also held during the event.



**FORT PIERCE**

The City of Fort Pierce hosted an open house, during which the public could visit each department to ask questions and receive information about the various services the city provides. Fort Pierce also offered tours of City Hall to local schools. The two events provided a great learning experience for residents.

**FORT WALTON BEACH**

The City of Fort Walton Beach adopted a Florida City Government Week proclamation. The city also participated in a municipal shadow program and held a luncheon to honor its employees. Elected officials and the senior leadership team greeted employees as they entered the facility and then served lunch to them. A photo montage of individual employees at work throughout the year was displayed at the luncheon, and the "Manager of the Year" and "Employees of the Year" were recognized.



**FREEPORT**

The mayor, council members and city planner participated in a career day at the local elementary school so that students could learn more about their city government. The feedback from students was excellent – they wrote thank you notes and some even stated they would like to become involved with city politics. The City of Freeport also established The Heritage Center of Freeport, a museum that houses city artifacts and a library of historical facts dating back to the 1800s.



**GAINESVILLE**

Each year, a special field trip is offered to the fifth grade "Citizens of the Month" in Alachua County public schools. Approximately 25 students (and a parent chaperone) tour various city facilities, including City Hall, a recreation center, a fire station and the police station. The day ends with the students being recorded for a government channel public-service announcement and meeting with a city commissioner. In addition, the city adopted a Florida City Government Week resolution. This year's events mark the eighth year that the school board has partnered with the city to offer this educational opportunity.



**GREENACRES**

The City of Greenacres hosted job-shadowing opportunities for high school students. Two of the students were even able to sit in during an employee’s probationary evaluation review. City Hall and facility tours were offered and staff included a cultural awareness/ethnic education day to provide information about the city’s demographics, foods and customs. Information was shared with an afterschool program and to children, ages five to 14, with developmental disabilities.



**HALLANDALE BEACH**

The City of Hallandale Beach hosted 17 student ambassadors from Gulfstream Middle School during the city’s Fourth Annual Government Day event. The students were divided into groups that spent the morning with one of six different departments, including police, fire, development services, parks and recreation, human services, and public works. Then, the students met at City Hall, where they were greeted by the mayor, commissioners and additional city staff. During a working pizza lunch, the students prepared presentations about what they had learned to share with their fellow classmates. The event ended with the students visiting the city commission chambers, where they received participation certificates.



**HAWTHORNE**

This was the third year that Chester Shell Elementary School’s fifth-grade class has visited City Hall. The mayor and city manager used the League’s “ABCs of City Government” to teach the class about how their city government works. During a mock election that followed, students ran for a commission seat. Those elected took a seat on the dais and selected a mayor and vice mayor. The “kids commission” appointed a city attorney, city clerk and city manager, who in turn hired various city department heads from the class. This helped the students to understand how many people it takes to run a city.

**HILLIARD**

The Town of Hilliard passed a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week and held an essay contest for fourth-grade students at Hilliard Elementary School. The contest theme was “If I was the Mayor of the Town of Hilliard, I would...” Hilliard’s mayor chose three winners, each of whom received a certificate. In addition, the first place winner received \$25, the second place winner received \$15, and the third place winner received \$10. The awards were presented at Hilliard Elementary School.



**HOLLYWOOD**

Hollywood’s mayor issued a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week and encouraged all Florida city officials to participate in the activities. The city presented Code Enforcement Officer Thomas Pinder with its Diamond Service Award, which is the highest honor a city employee can receive. The award recognizes employees who consistently render superior service to the public and their

co-workers. Along with Pinder, nine other nominees were recognized. The city also recognized 70 employees who achieved service anniversaries. They total 1,095 years of combined service.



**ISLAMORADA**

Islamorada invited fifth-grade students to submit an essay titled “What Islamorada Government Means to Me.” Each school chose the top six essays. Then, a local reporter chose one essay from each school for the top prize. Also, an art contest with the theme “When I think of Islamorada government, I think of.....” was held for third-grade students. Each school chose the top six pieces. A local artist selected the top piece, which was displayed at the Administrative Center and Public Safety Headquarters. Winners were recognized at a council meeting. In addition, the village hosted tours of various departments for social studies and civics classes.



**LAKE ALFRED**

The City of Lake Alfred approved a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week and held a mock commission meeting with the leadership team from the local middle school, Discovery Academy. The students were provided a written script, and each was assigned an active speaking part playing the roles of mayor, commissioners and various city staff. The “City Hall Experience” agenda included consideration of a resolution pertaining to “complete streets” and a grant funding request to help implement a bicycle and pedestrian safety program.



**LAKE PARK**

Lake Park adopted a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week. Two local schools visited Town Hall to participate in a mock commission meeting, tour various city departments, watch a public works demonstration, and participate in a “recycling” program and an educational skit hosted by the library. Students received “My Town: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It” bumper stickers and wore the “My Town” buttons. The town also hosted a city government tent at its monthly sunset celebration held at the marina, which featured a local government game with prizes. All elected officials were there to meet with guests and answer questions.



**LANTANA**

The Town of Lantana passed a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week. The mayor and town manager also taught local and state history to approximately 160 students at Lantana Elementary School and Lantana Middle School.

**MARGATE**

The City of Margate hosted a Student Government Day with 19 Margate Middle School students and two teachers touring different city departments. They also held a mock commission meeting. A city commissioner guided the students as they played the roles of elected officials, staff and the public. After the meeting, the students toured the police department, fire department, water plant and public works department. The City Commission also passed a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week.



**NEW SMYRNA BEACH**

The New Smyrna Beach City Commission adopted a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week. The city also partnered with New Smyrna Beach High School and held a mock city commission meeting in the commission chambers. Students took the roles of elected and appointed city officials. During the mock meeting, the student commission considered action regarding existing regulations of tattoos and body piercing. Lunch was served upon adjournment.



**ORANGE CITY**

Orange City Elementary School's Student Government Association visited the Orange City council chambers to learn about their government and to tour the historic town hall. The students met with the mayor, council members and city manager, and they asked the city officials a variety of question. After a luncheon, the students were given various roles and participated in a mock council meeting, during which they voted on an ordinance.

**NICEVILLE**

The City of Niceville adopted a resolution for Florida City Government Week. In addition, approximately 100 students, seven teachers and volunteers from Edge Elementary School visited the Niceville city complex for a full day of learning and fun. They toured the fire department, police department and public library, and they met with the mayor. Students learned about their community and the various types of city jobs, along with the skills needed for those jobs. After the tour, the students spent some time at the Niceville children's park, which is part of the city complex.



**ORANGE PARK**

Orange Park partnered with Oakleaf Village Elementary school and conducted a presentation to two third-grade classes. The mayor talked to the students about his elected role and provided information on the functions and role of city government.



**ORMOND BEACH**

The Ormond Beach City Commission proclaimed October 23 as Employee Appreciation Day. The city thanked its employees for their service with a picnic lunch, recognition of significant work anniversaries, and honored specific employees for their "Above-and-Beyond" achievements over the year. Also, the fire department visited pre-schools and elementary schools and spoke to more than 200 children.



**PALATKA**

A group of local students from Crescent City Junior/Senior High School took over for Palatka city commissioners, holding a mock commission meeting during Palatka's city government week activities. BOYZ II MEN, a faith-based mentoring group for young men 10 to 17 years old, spent the afternoon at City Hall before beginning Palatka's regular City Commission meeting with their own "mock" meeting. The group of more than 30 students held an election in preparation of the mock commission meeting. Prior to carrying out their "elected" duties, the students learned about city government and careers from local officials and professionals.



**PARKER**

The City of Parker hosted local students to take part in a variety of activities. The students worked with fire rescue staff, learned about water meters and the public works department, and served as honorary staff and elected official for the day. The students also held a press conference to discuss their honorary roles and their ideas for improving their city. A proclamation was adopted recognizing the honorary city officials.



**PARKLAND**

Approximately 350 third-grade students visited the City of Parkland City Hall Complex over the course of two days. The students met with city commissioners, the city manager and city staff, and they participated in a question-and-answer session that taught them about the inner workings of their city government. Students also took a tour of the fire station and police department, along with receiving a “backstage” tour of the city’s library.



**PORT ST. LUCIE**

Port St. Lucie residents enjoyed several events recognizing Florida City Government Week, beginning with a council resolution about the importance of local government. Then, elected officials, staff, business owners and residents enjoyed a week of memories at events

such as Latin Dance night, and they rediscovered the city’s oldest asset — the St. Lucie River — at a sunset gathering on the boardwalk. They also celebrated a dog park grand opening, gathered for the unveiling of a beautiful new butterfly mosaic in the Botanical Gardens and attended a plant sale.



**SANFORD**

City of Sanford officials visited area schools and spoke to students about city government. The mayor, city manager and a police captain visited students at four elementary schools and shared information about their roles and how young people can play a part in being good citizens. The students learned about the meaning and importance of public service and the many services provided by the city.



**SEMINOLE**

The City of Seminole City Council adopted a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week in the recently built mock-council chambers at the St. Petersburg College Seminole campus. The new, tiered classroom was constructed based upon the city’s actual council chamber at City Hall. Students in the college’s public policy administration degree program attended the council meeting.



**ST. AUGUSTINE**

The City of Augustine’s mayor and commissioners partnered with local elementary schools. Each of the five commissioners visited a school and led the morning announcements with the Pledge of Allegiance. The commissioners also distributed the “My City” buttons and

bumper stickers to all students and teachers, and they presented a certificate of appreciation to each of the schools for their continuing participation in city government week.



**TARPON SPRINGS**

The City of Tarpon Springs' mayor and city clerk swore-in student council officers from Tarpon Springs Elementary School. The ceremony was held in the commission chamber at City Hall. Third-, fourth- and fifth-grade "senators" were also sworn-in. Among other things, the mayor encouraged the students to be active on their council and also to participate in the civics programs in their school. The press and public were invited to attend. "My City" buttons and bumper stickers were made available to students and public.



**WESTON**

The City of Weston issued a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week and published an article about the week and the role of government in its weekly online newsletter, *Newsday Tuesday*. The city also initiated Weston University, an annual civic education program teaching select high school students about municipal government and public sector occupations. The program encourages students to realize their potential to shape and influence government as well as the educational partnerships between city government and schools.



**WINDERMERE**

For the ninth year, the Town of Windermere welcomed Windermere Elementary School's third-grade students to Town Hall. Six classes visited Town Hall over two mornings. They learned about the town's

government from the mayor, and about public safety from Windermere's police chief and Ocoee's fire chief. The town officials and first responders educated the students on what it takes to run a town, protect residents and how tax dollars are spent.

Municipal officials can play a big part in helping to educate residents about their city government. Florida City Government Week is one way to make that happen. Everyone benefits from an informed public!

# Cities Volunteer Their Time, Showcase Their Services During Florida City Government Week

**C**ities across Florida celebrated Florida City Government Week, sponsored by the Florida League of Cities, from October 21 to October 27, 2012. They used the week to highlight city accomplishments, volunteer time and educate residents on the services they provide. Florida City Government Week is held each year in October, utilizing the theme coined by the League's executive director emeritus, the late Raymond C. Sittig: "My City: I'm Part of It, I'm Proud of It!"

Programs and activities varied from city to city. However, each city strove to educate its residents about the public services and programs provided to them in their hometown. The following is a compilation of reports received from many of the cities that recognized this special week of municipal accomplishment and public service.

### **City of Arcadia**

Arcadia adopted a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week and held an open house. The city also placed an editorial in the local newspaper describing how local government works for residents and invited the public to the open house to meet council members, city volunteers, and board and committee members. Each

of the volunteers, board and committee members were recognized with a Certificate of Appreciation for their dedication to the city.

### **City of Bartow**

The Bartow Mayor's Youth Council conducted a mock city commission meeting with members acting as commissioners, newspaper reporters and city residents. In addition to adopting a proclamation, which was accepted by Commissioner Leo Longworth, the students also considered a proposal regarding the feasibility of a skate park.



### City of Belle Glade

Glade View Elementary School student government members toured Belle Glade City Hall and were greeted by the mayor, commissioners, the city manager and department heads. The students also participated in a poster contest, with posters displayed in the City Hall lobby. In November, city commissioners received presentations from winners of the “My City: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It!” essay contest, submitted by students of Glades Central Community High School, Lake Shore Middle School and Crossroads Academy. Awards were presented to the first-, second- and third-place winners from each school. A picture capturing one of these special moments was posted on the home page of the city’s website.

### Broward League of Cities

Broward League of Cities President and Fort Lauderdale City Commissioner Bobby DuBose reported that Broward County’s cities are more than halfway to their goal of logging 1 million volunteer service hours by May 31, 2013 – and volunteer efforts made by municipalities during Florida City Government Week helped significantly. The City of Fort Lauderdale is onboard with the Broward League’s campaign and has affirmed its commitment by issuing a “Together We Serve Week” resolution. In addition to the City of Fort Lauderdale, the Broward County School Board, the business community, other cities and the Broward County government have taken steps to help achieve this goal.

### Town of Callahan

Callahan hosted ROTC students from West Nassau High School at a mock town-council meeting. The real Town Council sat in the audience while the students sat in their places. ROTC members were given an agenda that contained local issues for them to discuss and share their views. The town also distributed “My City” buttons and bumper stickers and adopted a resolution recognizing the week.

### City of Callaway

Callaway hosted a Civic Trade Show for the public to attend and learn helpful tips and interesting facts about their city. Residents learned everything from lessons on how to read their water meter to key city facts and trivia.


Activities included an educational event and mock elections at the Cape Canaveral library; Leisure Services Bingo; a tour of the post office; and tours and educational activities at the recreation complex, the Brevard County Sheriff’s Office Canaveral Precinct and the Viera Courthouse.

### City of Davenport

Davenport held its activities in conjunction with the city’s newly renovated firehouse. Buttons and bumper stickers were distributed to residents, and the city adopted a proclamation recognizing the week.

### City of Deerfield Beach

Deerfield Beach issued a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week and held Student

Government Days on two separate days, inviting fourth- through 12th-graders from local elementary, middle and high schools. Students were greeted at City Hall by Mayor Peggy Noland before boarding two tour buses for a guided tour of the city. The students enjoyed a visit to the International Fishing Pier, where they observed presentations about current pier renovations and ocean rescue operations. They also were taken to the city’s Westside Park, where they observed a live K-9 demonstration and learned what it takes to be a police officer and firefighter/EMT. Students were then able to enjoy lunch while learning about the city’s “All In” recycling program. Finally, they visited the water plant and learned about the water filtration process and how raw water is transformed into clean drinking water.

**City of Delray Beach**

Delray Beach hosted a number of activities to enable the community to learn about their city and the importance of public involvement. City staff visited with more than 240 third-, fourth- and fifth-grade students from Plumosa School of the Arts and presented information on the responsibilities of a city manager and how to pursue a career in local government. The students were also engaged with various polling questions and a Q&A session. In addition, the city’s fire-rescue department visited with more than 100 students at Carver Middle School and discussed services that the department provides.

Students also assisted in assembling “Vials for Life,” resident health and medication information packets to be kept on file to assist with emergency medical care. Later, the Delray Beach Youth Council attended the October 16 City Commission meeting to present the commission and the community with information on their activities. The students gained valuable leadership skills and public presentation experience and had the opportunity to observe/learn about local government protocol.

**City of Destin**

On October 24, the city held an open house at the Destin Community Center that showcased Destin’s major accomplishments for the year. As part of the open house,

the city hosted 10 partner organizations that highlighted their services within the city. Staff cooked and served lunch for the public. An estimated 275 people attended the event.

The City of Destin, in coordination with the Okaloosa County League of Cities, also managed the first-ever Municipal Job Shadow Week. Mayors, city

council members and staff in Okaloosa County had an opportunity to job-shadow someone from a fellow city in a similar job, with the goal of learning how to improve governmental processes. The program was a success, with 22 people from 12 municipalities participating. A proclamation was also made by the City of Destin to recognize Municipal Job Shadow Week. The city coordinated with local media, which covered both the open house and Municipal Job Shadow Week.

**City of Fort Lauderdale**

This year during Florida City Government Week, students from the three Fort Lauderdale high schools experienced firsthand what it’s like to be a participating member of the city.



*City of Destin*

Over the past two years, Fort Lauderdale has undertaken the task of forming its vision for the next century. The City Commission wants to ensure that every resident's voice is heard during the process. To that end, during Florida City Government Week, city representatives, along with Commissioner Bobby B. DuBose, visited Stranahan and Dillard high schools; meanwhile, Fort Lauderdale High School staged a field trip to City Hall to work on the city's vision. The entire visioning process and the importance of their opinions were explained to the students. Involving students in the city's process proved to be an educational one for teachers and city representatives as well. Ideas about sustainability, traffic, transportation, teen volunteerism, crime and safety, teen clubs (something similar to a Boys and Girls Club) and homelessness were all topics that were discussed, with proposed solutions ultimately given.

The City of Fort Lauderdale has set up a visioning website where all ideas can be logged and residents can view and comment. The website allows for a more global conversation between neighbors from all communities in the city, including the student community. Approximately 200 ideas were logged from students alone.

### City of Frostproof

Frostproof held a "Great American Teach-In" for its Florida City Government Week activity. The city hosted seven second-grade classes from Frostproof Elementary School, providing a tour of City Council chambers and the sheriff's office, both located in City Hall. During the tour of the council chambers, City Manager Tenny R. Croley gave a brief history of cities, including the City of Frostproof and how it got its name. She also explained



the governance process and who "runs" City Hall, as well as the services provided by various departments in the council-manager form of government. In addition, Croley also read each class a book. She also visited Ben Hill Griffin Jr. Elementary School and provided the same information to fourth-graders, as well as reading a book.

### City of Greenacres

Greenacres adopted a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week and held a combined Florida City Government Week/100 Best Communities for Young People event on October 29. The building department executed an interactive puppet show to educate children on fire safety and building permits/codes, and the fire marshal put out a fire with Silly String. The Afterschool Program performed a skit, with *The Shining Acres* (composed of superheroes, sidekicks and villains) performing some of what they learned on city department tours.

Jordan LaPier, senior director for 100 Best Communities – America's Promise Alliance, presented Mayor Samuel J. Ferreri with the city's fifth 100 Best Communities award. City Council Members Jonathan Pearce, Paula Bousquet and John Tharp, Deputy Mayor Peter Noble, state Reps. Mark Pafford and Lori Berman, and parents of the students were present. The *Palm Beach Post* and the *Greenacres Observer* published articles about Florida City Government Week activities and events.

### **City of Hawthorne**

Hawthorne participated in Florida City Government Week by hosting a “Kids Commission.” Fourth- and fifth-graders from Chester Shell Elementary School went to City Hall, where they were welcomed by Mayor Matthew Surrency and City Manager Ellen Vause. The mayor briefed the class on how a city is operated and how elected officials make decisions affecting the city.

To introduce the students to how city government works, a Kids Commission election was held to elect commissioners from the class. After the student commissioners were elected and seated, the first order of business was to elect a mayor and vice mayor. The new commission sat on the dais and used the gavel to open the meeting. Next, they hired a city manager, city attorney and city clerk, along with support staff in public works. This engaged most of the student body with a job title.

After organizing the commission and staff, the Kids Commission passed a resolution on school uniforms to notify the school that the commission did not support the wearing of such uniforms. The support for this resolution was demonstrated by student voters, who responded to a question on the ballot: “Do you agree with the requirement to wear a school uniform?” Ninety percent of the kids voted against the requirement.

Mayor Surrency has received many letters of appreciation from the students, and the school is planning to start a student government club with the students.

### **Town of Juno Beach**

Juno Beach recognized Florida City Government Week by holding a collection of items in honor of Veterans Day and U.S. troops currently serving in Afghanistan. The town distributed informative flyers that included a list of items most needed by both military veterans and troops. Also, website postings and mass emails were submitted to local residents and local businesses. Two nearby churches also helped in this cause. Thanks to all of these efforts, the town received generous donations that were then delivered to the appropriate organizations.

### **Town of Jupiter**

Jupiter presented a proclamation to Boy Scout Troop 774, which attended the Town Council meeting for citizenship badges. “My City: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It!” buttons and bumper stickers were also at the meeting and in the Town Hall lobby for the Boy Scouts and other residents to pick up.

### **City of Lake Alfred**

Lake Alfred recognized Florida City Government Week with a proclamation. Again this year, the city participated in the Great American Teach-In. Elected officials and staff members from various municipal departments volunteered their time to educate local students in civics education, local politics, fire prevention, and recycling and sanitation. The ultimate goal was to teach the students that they can become active participants within the community and make a difference in the city’s quality of life.

### **Town of Lake Park**

Lake Park adopted a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week. In addition, two local schools participated in tours of Lake Park Town Hall and Lake Park Library. They also viewed a PowerPoint presentation, “How Your City Government Works,” as well as a reenactment of the hurricane of 1928 that destroyed the original Kelsey City.



### City of Margate

Margate celebrated the week by hosting its annual Student Government Day for Margate Middle School students. Student Government Day began in the City Hall commission chambers with a mock city-commission meeting, followed by tours of city departments including the police department, the Calypso Cove aquatics facility, a fire station and the city's water treatment facility. Students closed out the day at the public works facility.

It was Margate's seventh year hosting Student Government Day with the middle school.

### City of Newberry

Newberry adopted a resolution recognizing Florida City Government Week on October 22 and posted information showcasing the week on the city's website and Facebook page, as well as the local government information channel. Pins and bumper stickers were also provided to elected officials, staff and the general public in recognition of Florida City Government Week. In addition, the city partnered with the local elementary school and hosted open-house tours for students to heighten their awareness of city government and its departments.

### City of North Lauderdale

North Lauderdale brought Youth Government Day activities and the student city commission meeting back to City Hall this year.

Fifteen ninth-graders from Somerset Preparatory Academy Charter School toured City Hall, a fire station and a Bro-

ward County district sheriff's office in preparation for their student-led commission meeting.

After a long day of touring and rehearsals, the students returned to City Hall to conduct their mock commission meeting. With the help of a sparse script, the student mayor proceeded through the meeting and two youth-related item presentations – an anti-bullying policy and the establishment of an after-school education program for grades 9-12. Student city commission members kept the meeting interesting with insightful questions and dissenting opinions.

### City of North Port

Understanding that residents' engagement in local government is paramount, the City of North Port traditionally celebrates Florida City Government Week throughout the entire month of October. This year, North Port kicked off the celebration with a resolution approved by the City Commission on September 24. Many activities took place throughout the month. Informational tables featured city literature at signature events, including "Arts Night at City Hall" and the North Port Area Chamber of Commerce's annual "Hob Nob."

The city's activities also included the annual "Government on Wheels" program. Created five years ago, the program allows for city commissioners and employees

to be featured as guest speakers in local classrooms. In total, the program reached an estimated 1,500 students from five elementary schools, two middle schools and two high schools. Five city commissioners and 16 city employees participated in the program.

### Town of Oakland

Oakland owns and operates the Oakland Avenue Charter School, a K-5 facility with about 525 students. Each year, the town hosts a shadowing day, during which the students have opportunities to shadow the town manager and town engineer. Town staff also participate in judging the fifth-grade students' science projects.

**City of Okeechobee**

Okeechobee adopted a resolution recognizing the week. The city also participated in the annual Career Day sponsored by Communities in Schools. All ninth- and 11th-graders enrolled at Okeechobee High School, as well as home-schooled students, participated. Each student had to pick at least three careers of interest to them, visit the booths highlighting those careers, and ask specific questions relating to salaries, job titles and duties, and retirement. The city’s booth had 178 students stop by and obtain information about a career in local government. All areas were represented, from elected officials and administrators to firefighters, police officers and detectives, and public-works maintenance operators, along with an outdoor display of equipment.

**City of Orange City**

Orange City recognized Florida City Government Week by inviting the student government association from Orange City Elementary School to council chambers. The students met with council members and the city manager to learn how the city is governed. They listened, asked questions and ate lunch together. These future leaders also participated in a poster contest with the theme “Why I Love Orange City.” Three winners were chosen and received gift cards to Walmart. The winning posters were posted on the city’s Facebook page. In addition, the students were taken on a tour of City Hall and the fire department to showcase some of the other services Orange City offers to residents.

**City of Palatka**

Palatka partnered with members of Palatka High School’s Student Government Council classes to provide students with real-time government experiences. On October 27, students visited City Hall to learn about local government, as well as to meet with and speak to city officials and department heads about municipal careers, elected offices and volunteer opportunities in municipal government. They also participated in the public portion of that evening’s Palatka City Commission meeting.

Prior to the meeting, students held an election and learned about different forms of government. They met with city officials and department heads to learn about how local government affects their lives and the various career opportunities in local government, and spoke with both elected and appointed officials about their respective roles. Students learned how local laws are created, and aided in crafting a proclamation for issuance during a mock meeting.

The experience concluded during that evening’s City Commission meeting, during which Mayor Vernon Myers issued a proclamation declaring November 2 as Palatka High School Student Government Day, and then presented Good Citizenship Awards to the

**City of Parkland**

In addition, Mayor Andy Steingold visited the local elementary school and appeared on its morning show, where he explained the significance of city government and read the proclamation. Also, Commissioner Nancy Besore visited the Mattie Williams Neighborhood Family Center to speak to children about the importance of city government.



**City of Sanford**

Mayor Jeff Triplett, Commissioner Mark McCarty, Commissioner Velma Williams and City Manager Norton Bonaparte visited four public schools – Seminole High School, Sanford Middle School, Crooms Academy of Information Technology and Millennium Middle School – to talk with students about Sanford and all of the municipal services provided by the city.

Questions asked by the students included ones about Hurricane Sandy, clean water and skateboard parks. One of the visits included a breakfast with U.S. Rep. John

As a result of the positive outcomes generated during Florida City Government week, the mayor has proposed the creation of a City of Sanford Youth Council in 2013.

**City of Seminole**

The “Introduction to Urban Politics and Government” course at the University of South Florida St. Petersburg recognized Florida City Government Week on October 24 by organizing a celebration acknowledging the importance of the more than 400 cities in Florida. Professor Leslie Waters, the vice mayor of Seminole, and the students pinned their “My City” buttons on, held up “My City: I’m Part of It, I’m Proud of It!” bumper stickers, and displayed the names of cities in the Tampa Bay area that they are researching, earning internship hours at, or visiting as part of the fall-term class.

**City of Sopchoppy**

Sopchoppy participated in Florida City Government Week by visiting Medart Elementary School and speaking to the fourth-grade classes about municipal governments. Using information gained from the Florida League of Cities website and from local sources, a booklet was created for the students that included everything from the history of

Visits by city officials to area schools during Florida City Government Week has become a tradition in recent years. The visits provide an opportunity for city leaders and students to meet, creating an opportunity to put a spotlight on the significant role local government has in residents' everyday lives.

### **City of St. Cloud**

The city hosted 16 seniors from St. Cloud High School during Florida City Government Week. The visit highlighted the many facets of city government and its services to the community, as well as ways that everyone can actively participate in their local government. It also reinforced the sense of community enjoyed in St. Cloud. The program included introductions by the City Council, city manager and department directors. There was also a City Hall tour, and students met with assigned city

council members, the city manager, the city attorney and staff in preparation for the mock city-council meeting.

### **City of Titusville**

Titusville set up displays from all departments at City Hall. It also distributed educational material on city operations and programs.

### **City of Valparaiso**

The city adopted a proclamation and focused on a job-shadowing week. Some of the department heads shadowed their peers in other cities, and another city shadowed one of Valparaiso's department heads.

### **Village of Wellington**

Wellington posted daily questions on the village website for residents to provide their feedback. Also, the village hosted an informational booth at Village Hall, where staff was able to interact with residents. Those interested also were able to take a tour of the building.

### **City of Weston**

Weston adopted a proclamation recognizing Florida City Government Week and provided the League's "My

## Town of Windermere



City: I'm Part of It, I'm Proud of It!" pins at a City Commission meeting that featured the swearing-in of the new mayor and commissioners. The city also initiated its annual "Weston University" program. Weston University is designed to provide a unique civic education for Weston high school sophomores, juniors and seniors. Each year, the program commences during Florida City Government Week.

Weston University is a program that meets for a day-long session once a month over an eight-month period. Sessions are held on-site at various locations where city services are provided, and include field visits. Through instruction, open conversations, observations, demonstrations and actual experiences, students are exposed to and educated on the details involved in running municipal departments on a day-to-day basis. They are also taught about state and local government by elected officials.

The students learn problem-solving procedures used by city government, recognizing the positions taken by city officials and the reasons behind them. For the last official session of the program, students participate in a mock city commission meeting after having gained the knowledge necessary to present and defend both sides of agenda issues. Upon successful completion of the program, they graduate from Weston University and are honored at a City Commission meeting.

### Town of Windermere

In what has become an October tradition, the third-grade students of Windermere Elementary School took a walk to Windermere Town Hall to learn about the town's government, police department and fire department. It took two mornings to accommodate all nine of the classes in half-day sessions where they learned about their community. A project that started out as an experiment in educating students about their government and civics has evolved into an annual event that provides a foundation for students' involvement in government and an opportunity to meet local leaders.

The third-graders were greeted by Windermere Mayor Gary Bruhn, who provided them with a history of the town and discussed how it functions and the services that are provided. Students then heard from Windermere Deputy Police Chief Arthur Mueller and Ocoee Fire Chief Pete McNeil. Both explained the jobs that they do and how their departments operate, and then answered the many questions that the students had.

The classes then were given presentations on the equipment that is used, and they were able to hold a police officer's protective vest, sit in the front of a police vehicle, look at all of the lifesaving tools that their fire department uses, and learn what a day in the life of a firefighter is like. After a full morning of learning, they visited an ice cream shop for a treat before heading back to school.
